HEALTHY... WELL-THY ...& WISE! The Welcome/Morning Circle Unpacked Setting up for success

The Welcome/Morning Circle is most powerful when it is implemented consistently and predictably. This means establishing a set time when circle occurs, as well as a clear structure for how long it will go for and expectations for the routine. At Sheidow this occurs in every class at the start of each day. In some classes the students are able to run circle themselves.

What are the vital elements of our Welcome/Morning Circle?

Greeting - why greetings?

We start Welcome/Morning Circle with a couple of minutes for students to greet each other and connect. This simple, intentional act can form an important part of supporting the formation of bonding relationships between students (Warren et al., 2009). This critical part of our role as teachers is to act as connection makers: as well as taking time to individually greet students ourselves, that we also give them time to connect with each other. As a part of greeting, we explicitly encourage students to call out each other's names with warmth and enthusiasm so that everyone can feel fully seen.

Values and expectations – Why values and expectations?

Values and expectations are an important component for encouraging student voice in the classroom, as well as building safety and predictability. Identifying shared values in an authentic way provides a pathway for common direction and purpose in learning. Rather than assuming our students know what behaviours we want from them, we want to be explicit and clearly articulate our expected behaviours, as well as what they can expect from us, and to be explicit in what they can do – is it okay for students to use fidget tools? What are the protocols if they get overwhelmed, and need a moment to self-regulate?

Why announcements?

We believe that every student has the right to feel seen and celebrated. Sharing our positive news with others, and having it received with active enthusiasm, can boost happiness, wellbeing and vitality (Lambert, 2013). A quick round of announcements allows students to celebrate positive news with each other, and to build a reservoir of positive emotions that they can draw on in the future.

What went well – Why a 'WWW'?

Using this technique that has emerged from wellbeing sciences, we encourage students to reflect on what went well (WWW). These are a simple and effective way to build positive reflection and savour their achievements. We use this strategy to gently build the capacity of our students to see themselves and their peers in a positive light.

The Women's Soccer World Cup starts during the school holidays and since this huge event is being held in Australia and New Zealand this July / August I would like to do something in the school to celebrate it.



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Book week is 19th-25th August 2023. The theme this year is 'Read, Grow, Inspire.'


A costume parade day is planned for Thursday 24th August 2023. Both teachers and students will be taking part.

Digital payments only

From the 1st of July the Education Department has made the decision that all payments made to care services must be in digital form such as the QKR App/ credit card or Eftpos payments. Cash will no longer be accepted. Please contact the service if you have any questions regarding this.

OSHC Fees

A reminder that the service requires fortnightly payments made to accounts. These do not always have to be the full amount owing, but something needs to be added regularly. Once an account reaches \$100 it is our policy to send a text message to remind families to please make a payment. If nothing is received a reminder letter will be sent and your child will be unable to attend the service until a payment is received.


